## Registration is Open to the Public!

As of Monday, February 3rd, ASDS Registration for the 2020-2021 school year is open to the public. It's not too late to register returning students, but



please don't delay as classes will fill quickly. Remember that two-year-olds may begin on their second birthday and full potty training is not a pre-requisite. All Saints' will also be offering a Kindergarten Transition program next year. Transitional kindergarten is a school grade that serves as a bridge between preschool and kindergarten, functioning to provide students with time to develop fundamental skills needed for success in school in an age- and developmentally-appropriate setting. This class will be limited to older fours and fives. Five day program attendance is required. Enrollment is based on meeting developmental assessment and teacher recommendation criteria.

## Setting Your Child Up for Success

Teachers Marianne and Cathy expanded on the differentiations between their two classes and shared how placement recommendations will be made for the fall of 2020 at a session held on Tuesday, January 7<sup>th</sup> @ 8:30 a.m. in Library.


A lot will happen developmentally for your child in the next year or two, but we encourage parents not rely on the chronological age eligibility for kindergarten alone in deciding on where your five-year-old should be. Many educators and "parents-in-the-know" choose to give their children an extra year of development; especially if they will be among the youngest in their class or if they are males. Your child's readiness is not limited to his/her academic ability. School success factors also include social maturity, social problem solving, independence, resilience, stamina, fine and visual-motor coordination, body control, spatial relations, etc. As parents we also need to be thinking down the road and factor in the present day challenges of middle and high school with social networking, physical maturity, and vulnerability to peer pressure.



I recommend three resources for you.

1) Outliers by Malcolm Gladwell
The author explains how many
successful people reached their goals.
Leveraged by proven studies from
musicians to athletes to business
owners Gladwell denoted that success
is a matter of practice and hard work.

Natural talent is a mere bonus.



He also points to a chronological age factor for school entrance and the onset of participation in team sports.

# 2) Building Resilience in Children and Teens: Giving Children Roots and Wings by Kenneth R. Ginsberg, MD, FAAP

This book is a resource to help you help your children build resilience. Along with timeless content about how to help your child gain the 7 C's- competence, confidence, connection, character,



contribution, coping, and control- this important parent resource includes updated chapters on topics like perfectionism, media literacy, and styles of discipline. New in this edition are 3 new chapters about Grit, offering meaningful protection against the effects of childhood trauma, and preparing families for lifelong interdependence.


## Are You An Artist?



The kindergarteners eased into the new year and winter discussing hibernation, migration and adaptation. We read about and discussed what different animals do in winter. The children truly enjoyed making bird feeders to hang in the trees outside our classroom. We saw a few cardinals and lots squirrels "adapting" to their surroundings while enjoying our creations.





In the kitchen, the dolphin class made Happy New Year Nachos (N), Ohhh it's cold outside Oatmeal (O),



Penguins in a blanket (P), Quick blueberry muffins (Q). The children really enjoy our cooking time. While "in the kitchen", we are able to introduce and or reinforce several math concepts such number recognition, greater than and less than, as well as fractions. Every week the children

also write a recipe, review and rate their recipes; reinforcing the letter of the week as well as their sight word vocabulary. This month we had lots of positive feedback on all the recipes, however the nachos were our biggest success. As always, all the recipes and reviews were placed in the children's A-Z cookbook which will come home in May.

In Science and Social Studies, the children learned about oceans and the five levels in the ocean. The kids did several experiments testing the density and salinity of the ocean and the effects of the sun not reaching the lowest levels of the ocean. We also learned about Polar Bears and penguins. In their favorite experiment, the kids tested putting their hands in ice cold water with and without a blubber mitt. Many of us were surprised how

warm and dry the blubber kept our hands.

We continued with our guided drawing activities this month as well. The children drew polar bears which can be seen outside our classroom. They also drew penguins using their crayons and water colors. The penguins were so amazing we are saving them for the art show in the Spring. The directed drawing activities show me so many things, a few of which are, following simple instructions, patience and where children are as far as maturity. I am so impressed with how far they have all come since September. I've been saving some of their art to come home in May so the parents can actually make the comparisons for themselves.

As always, thank you entrusting your little ones with me each day. It truly is a joy and a privilege.

## 🌇 Ms. Marianne 4 Ms. Teresa

The Sea Otters are off to an amazing start in 2020! We kicked off the New Year by reviewing our ABC's, shapes, and patterns. Next, we had a blast discussing chemical reactions and engaging in a New Year's countdown experiment where we mixed baking soda, vinegar, and a ton of glitter!



During our first full week of January the Sea Otters learned about the letter N and became narwhal experts. We practiced building sentences with our sight words and sounding out

words to describe narwhals. We learned that narwhals are whales, they eat shrimp and squid, travel in pods, and the horn on their head is actually a tusk that grows through their upper lip. One of our favorite books that we read that week is <u>Jessie Sima</u>. The book is about a unicorn born in the sea amongst narwhals and sees that she is different. After traveling to find the other unicorns, the main character, Kelp, realizes that she doesn't have to choose between the narwhals and unicorns but that she can be friends with both. This book helped us focus on how we can be friends with everyone at school.

During the second week of January, the Sea Otters learned about the letter O and engaged in many fun snowman activities. We read <u>Olaf and the Three Polar Bears</u> by Calliope Glass and compared the words and events to Goldie Locks and the Three Bears. We



reviewed liquids and solids and tested out the following materials with the heat from a hair dryer to see if they would melt butter, marshmallows, chocolate, gummy bear, a toy truck, and a penny. We found out that the butter, marshmallow, chocolate, and gummy bear all melted. Then, we discussed how we could turn them

back in to a solid. After freezing the melted objects in the freezer we found that materials that melt can also be frozen and turned back in to a solid.

The third week was dedicated to learning about the letter P and penguins. To name a few of the fun facts we learned about penguins, we found out that there are 18 different types of species of penguins, they are birds that can't fly, and they live in warm and cold climates. We also painted our own penguins and measured them with cubes. Then, we compared their sizes and discussed which penguins were equal in height, smaller and larger. We reviewed our patterns by giving the penguins uniquely colored patterned scarfs. The Sea Otters have started to focus on numbers 1-20. To incorporate number concepts in to our penguin week, we played a penguin vs. polar bear game and counted and compared how many fish each animal had. The person with most fish won. We also glued pink and purple fish to penguins we crafted. Then, we counted and compared purple and pink fish and discussed the terms: equal amounts. greater than, less than, and all together.

During the last week of January we focused on the letter



Q and hibernating animals. We learned that not only do bears hibernate, but so do lady bugs, snakes, frogs, and groundhogs. One of our science questions was "how do animals that hibernate go so long without eating?" The answer is that they stock up for

winter and while they sleep they conserve more energy than when they are awake. To illustrate this concept we placed two different squares of butter in the same plastic containers and labeled one, "hibernation". Then, we left

the hibernating butter in the classroom closet all day and took the container labeled awake everywhere with us. We noticed that the butter had melted in the active container. This result showed us how fat burns off when we are awake and active.

addition, by 1's, has been fun too.




Talking about winter weather and hibernation was super interesting! The students made beautiful blue snowflakes with salt. We watched the salt expand

## Ms. Sandra & Ms. Beth & Ms. Terry

The Starfish students came back from Christmas break and were eager to get started with the new year. During the month of January, our themes were: Winter, Snow, Arctic Animals, Antarctic Animals, and Penguins. Our letters were W. P. K. and I. the numbers were 7 and 8, the shape was a star, and our colors were blue and white.

The first week back, we learned about winter and what types of clothes should be worn during the season. We read, The Jacket I Wear in the Snow, and did a "clothes sort". The students had to determine whether certain

clothing was appropriate for winter weather. They had flipflops, mittens, a swimsuit, boots, a scarf and other items they had to place in a winter pile or summer pile. We practiced



the difference between a mitten hand and a glove hand. We played a game where they had to place cold and hot items in the appropriate column.

The next week we learned about snow and ice. It was cold enough one night that we were able to put water



outside overnight in The Children's Garden, and they saw how freezing temperatures changed it from a liquid into a solid. We "made" snow out of baking soda and shaving cream. It actually was cool to the touch. Starfish students were mesmerized when we made a snowstorm

in a jar using oil, white paint, and an Alka-seltzer tablet.

Blue gems were frozen in ice "hands", and the children had to use plastic hammers and other tools to release them. We read, <u>Sneezy the Snowman</u>, and made melting snowmen using puffy paint made from shaving cream and glue. We also created ice paintings using

different colored ice cubes.



The third week of January was very exciting. We learned about different animals that live in the Arctic. The students learned about narwhals, polar bears, snowy owls, caribou, arctic foxes, beluga whales, harp seals and walruses.

The children used hammers and water spray bottles to rescue the arctic animals from one very large frozen iceberg, and they played with the animals with blue and white water beads that acted as an ocean.

The last week of the month we learned about Penguins and Antarctic Animals. We loved learning about all the different types of penguins, where they lived, how they kept warm in the cold water, and how they were able to

get themselves out of the water onto land. Playing with our penguins in real ice was a lot of fun for the students. They created a process art project of a penguin, but you can't see them yet. We are going to



reveal these creations at our annual art show.

During Center time throughout the month we continued working on letter recognition, counting, shape matching, and prewriting skills. The teachers are very proud of the progress the Starfish students have made since September and we are eager to see what February will bring.

Teacher Patsy and I want to thank you again for all of the presents, goodies, and kind cards that you gave

We focused on the letters Pp, Ss, and Ww this month. Our colors were blue and white. Rectangles were added to our shapes and the number

"7" to our numerals. We sang and learned the motions for "Snow Dance" and "Penguin Dance". The students learned from our book about penguins that penguins live in cold and warm environments and that they swim instead of fly! Other books we read this month were Clickety Clack, Winter White, The Very Hungry Caterpillar, Here Comes the Snow, and Snow Dance.

The students made snow scenes for <u>Winter White</u> to decorate our classroom door. The letter "P" was used as a launching pad for the students to make penguins. They also painted and made butterflies, decorative art, and tiles that will be displayed during April's art show.





We started the month reading, <u>Jangles: A Big Fish Story</u>, by David Shannon. This book is about the legend of Jangles. He is a huge trout that lives in a lake and everyone from far and near comes to the lake to try to catch him. He gets the name, Jangles, because you can hear him jingling and jangling, when he is swimming because he has so many hooks and lures in his mouth. One evening a boy feels a tug on his line and is terrified when he realizes it is, Jangles. Julia Donaldson is one of my favorite authors, and this month we read <u>The Snail and the Whale</u>, and <u>Superworm</u>, both by her. Each of these books teach children about the importance of teamwork to help out others who are in need.

What was hiding in a toaster, a pickle jar and a china teapot? Dinosaurs, of course! Flapdoodle Dinosaurs, by David A. Carter is a bright and colorful pop-up book filled with dinosaurs hiding throughout the story. All Aboard the Dino-Train, is a fun rhythmic rhyming book about a group of dinosaurs who decide to go on an adventure on a train. One problem, they are too heavy and the train has a hard time going anywhere, and when they do get going they don't arrive at their planned destination. They

decide next time they wouldn't take a train, but maybe a ... Plane!

We sang, "Five Little Snowmen", and "Five Little Penguins" and read, There Was A Cold Lady Who Swallowed Some Snow. Just so you know, she swallowed some snow to make a snowman!



Try to read with your child for

short periods, several times each day. Choose stories you enjoy reading to make it a more enthusiastic experience for both of you. If your child loves a book so much you have to continually read if over and over again, look for books by that author and get a few new ones to add to your library.
